## **Going Home After a Blood Transfusion**

A Blood transfusion is a medical treatment where donated blood or blood products are given to you through a narrow tube placed in a vein in your arm. Your risk of having a reaction with a blood transfusion is low. This handout will give you information on the symptoms you may have with a blood transfusion reaction and what you will need to do if you have these symptoms.

Mild symptoms you may have:	What to do if you have these symptoms:

<ul> <li>A fever above 38.0°C (100.4°F) for more than one (1) hour</li> <li>Mild chills – feeling cold</li> <li>Mild headache</li> </ul>	For patients having chemotherapy treatment Go to the closest Emergency Department. For all other patients Take an over the counter medication for fever or headache, such as Tylenol (acetaminophen). Follow the directions on the bottle.  Do not take this medication if your doctor has told you not to.
Mild rash, hives, itching	Take an over the counter medication for allergies, such as Benadryl (diphenhydramine) or Reactin (cetirizine). Follow the directions on the bottle.  Do not take this medication if your doctor has told you not to.
Serious symptoms:	What to do if you have these symptoms:
<ul> <li>Mild symptoms (listed above) that have not gone away one (1) hour after taking medication</li> <li>High fever – Temperature of 39.0°C (102.2°F)</li> <li>Nausea or vomiting</li> </ul>	Have someone drive you to see a doctor. For example: your family doctor, Urgent Care, or the closest Emergency Department.
Critical symptoms:	What to do if you have these symptoms:
<ul> <li>Severe chills – your body is shaking</li> <li>Problems breathing or feeling very short of breath</li> <li>Blood in your urine or dark coloured urine (even days after your transfusion)</li> <li>Migraine or severe headache</li> </ul>	You need to be taken to the closest Emergency Department right away.  Do not drive yourself to the Emergency Department.
